### Are Prioritizing **Public Education** in 2025

**Futuro San Antonio** is a community-powered coalition working to ensure every child in our city has access to high-quality public schools—whether traditional or public charter. In April 2025, we surveyed San Antonio voters to understand their priorities ahead of the municipal elections. The results are clear: education is no longer a side issue—it's now central to how people are thinking about the future of our city.

#### **Education is Now a Top-Tier Concern for Voters**

City Priorities	
1st	Crime
2nd	Jobs
3rd	Healthcare
4th	EDUCATION

- 1 in 3 voters listed **education** among their top 3 concerns
- Since October 2024 Education has jumped from 8th place to 4th on the list of citywide concerns—tied with healthcare and homelessness, and right behind crime and the economy.

**Voters under 45, women, and people of color** are driving this shift. Among voters of color, education ranks **second** only to crime as a top concern.

#### What San Antonians Want From Their Leaders on Education

#### ✓ Improve Safety, Mental Health, and Learning Outcomes

- 65% say improving reading and literacy should be a key city role.
- **Voters** support **stronger** school-business partnerships to prepare students for careers.
- Safety and well-being **remain** major concerns.

#### Expand Access to Excellent Public Schools

- 83% of voters support diverse school options, including traditional public and public charter schools.
- **Parents** especially want leaders to protect and expand access to high-quality school choices.

#### Invest in Teachers

- **Voters** overwhelmingly support city efforts to increase teacher pay, address shortages, and retain high-quality educators.
- 53% say investing in the education workforce is a top priority.

#### **How Voters Want the City to Lead**

### What This Means for San Antonio

- Voters are clear: They want city leaders who take education seriously.
- Families, young people, and communities of color are asking for safer schools, stronger teaching, and more choices.
- The future of our city depends on how we respond to this moment.

#### **About the Poll**

This poll was conducted April 2–3, 2025, with a sample of 477 registered San Antonio voters, including an oversample of 250 parents of public school children. Respondents were reached via live phone calls and SMS, and results were weighted by age, race, gender, and education to reflect likely 2025 municipal voter turnout. The margin of error is ±4.49%, offering a reliable snapshot of voter sentiment across the city.
